# From the Manager

On behalf of the staff of the Long Beach Marinas, we hope that you are enjoying your summer and spending time on the water. Our goal is to provide a safe and healthy marina environment. As the City of Long Beach, Marinas and Beaches manager, I am always open to hearing from our customers and will continue to provide answers and requested services to the best of our abilities and within our financial limitations.

In the last couple of weeks, I have heard from several boat owners regarding alcohol and boating. Most of the sightings have been of unaware Duffy® boat renters who are in our bays and harbors cruising around with little to no knowledge of the boating etiquette and laws, while possibly intoxicated. I want to reassure everyone that our Rescue Boat Operators are on the lookout for unsafe and erratic operators. They can and will issue citations as warranted.

In case you are not aware, while it is not illegal to drink on a boat, the California Harbors and Navigation Code prohibits operating a vessel under the influence of drugs or alcohol. Penalties may include up to \$1,000 fine and six months in jail. By operating a vessel in California waters, we have all consented to be tested for alcohol and/or drugs if arrested by a law enforcement official. The Division of Boating and Waterways website has more information on the topic.

Now for an update on a couple other items you requested and that we are working on. The "pony" gates as we are calling them for Basin 1 will be installed by the end of August. We are hopeful that these gates will limit the number of non-boat owner individuals engaging in mischief on the docks. These gates will be operated via a key pad like those at the oil dump stations; the code can and will be changed periodically. Please, please, please limit who you share this code with. We have ordered new locks for boat owner restrooms at Basins 1, 2 and 3. Information regarding the coordination of getting everyone new keys and installation of the locks will be coming. More than likely you will pick up the new keys at the end of the year when you pick up your new parking passes. For a few weeks, you will probably need to carry both keys as locks are changed.

Thank you for your patience, as I tell everyone, the wheels of the City are slower than those of justice.

# Don't Let It Slip Your Mind How To Avoid Penalties-Five Slip Payment Options

Our new marina software system has been up and running for over six months now and staff has been working very hard to ensure our customers have had an easy transition – hopefully that is the case. If not, as a reminder, we are here to help. If you are having trouble creating your on line marina portal or with your payment options please reach out to the marina office for help. Slip payments are due on the first of each month and considered late if not received by the 10th of each month. It is important to understand each option and choose what works best for you to ensure your payment is received by the 10th of the month in order to avoid a penalty. The five options available are:



- 1. Pay in person at the marina office.
- 2. Pay over the phone at your marina office. Alamitos Bay: (562) 570-3215. Long Beach Shoreline/Rainbow Harbor Marina: (562) 570-4950.
- 3. Online Payment: Visit your marina portal:

- 4. **Reoccurring Credit Card**: Automatic monthly payments charged to your credit card. Access the form at: www. longbeach.gov/departments/parks,recreation,&marine/marine/forms/recurring-credit-card-payment.
- 5. **Bill Pay:** Many times this option results in customers receiving penalties due to the processing timeline. If you choose Bill Pay through your bank, the bank has to cut a physical check and mail it to the marina office. The primary reasons causing this delay in the bill pay method are due to the following:
- A. Customer is scheduling payment too late: you must schedule payment BEFORE the 1st of the month to allow your bank enough time to issue and mail a check to us.
- B. Bank sends check payment to the marina office without any customer name, slip number or remittance stub included. WITHOUT any customer identification, it is difficult to correctly apply payment.

As always, if you have any questions please stop by the marina office and ask - we are here to help and make your payment options effortless.

# From California To The Hawaiian Islands Transpac Turns 50

This historic event was started in 1906 by Clarence W. Macfarlane and hosted by Los Angeles Yacht Club and organized by the Transpacific Yacht Club. The race is an offshore yacht race starting off the Pt. Fermin buoy in San Pedro, California and ending off Diamond Head in Hawaii, a distance of around 2,225 nautical miles (2,560 mi; 4,121 km). it is one of yachting's premier offshore races famous for fast downwind sailing under spinnaker in the trade winds and attracts entrants from all over the world.

The event has multiple start dates with the first round on July 10th. Boats are anticipated to be arriving off the Diamond Head finish line as soon as July 17th.

This year, for the first time in the Transpacific Yacht Race's history, a nine man crew of OEX began to take on water and sank. The crew was picked up by fellow competitor Roy Disney's Pyewacket after sending out an emergency signal.

# Boatowner Etiquette 101 Keeping The Docks In Order

#### **HOUSEKEEPING REMINDERS:**

**Washers and Dryers:** Please be courteous to fellow boaters when using the washers and dryers and do not leave items inside the machines unattended. Remove items promptly after use.

**Parking Lot Use:** All vehicles parked in marina lots must be moved every 72 hours to avoid a citation. The parking lot are for use by active boaters and must display a parking pass in left in the lot overnight.

**Dock Carts:** When returning dock carts please do not put them under the gangways. As the tide changes the carts are known to get stuck and damaged. Placing them on the side of the gangway would be a much better option.

**Items Left Outside/Around Vessel:** Please keep your area clean and tidy. Do not leave items on the docks/fingers when you are not at your vessel.

**Tenders:** Tenders must fit within the width and length of your allowable slip length.



# Keep Our Waters Pollution Free Honey Pot Day at Long Beach

June - September 2019

Got a holding tank? Get it emptied for FREE!!! Mobile Pumpout Service. The Santa Monica Bay restoration foundation,

bay restoration commission

in partnership with Department of Boating & Waterways, is providing free mobile pumpout

service for boaters in the Long Beach Harbor. Boaters must register in advance for a short, free informational seminar to receive a clean boating kit and a free mobile pumpout. The 30-minute seminar will be held weekday evenings and weekends.



To sign up for the program, boaters should visit www. honeypotday.org, which includes directions to a short video on how to operate a sewage pumpout unit, three brief publications to read, and an online quiz.

The program was established in 2009 to reduce levels of bacteria in local harbors. Dumping one toilet flush of untreated boat sewage can cause the same environmental impacts as 10,000 flushes from a homeowner's toilet, once that waste is treated by a municipal sewage

treatment plant (San Francisco Regional Water Quality Control Boat, 2009). By offering a convenient and free service, boaters are incentivized to properly dispose of sewage and keep our local waterways clean.

Since its initiation, nearly 1,879 boaters have been educated about the adverse effects of discharging sewage directly into waterways and over 57,073 gallons of sewage (the equivalent to 16,3000,000 flushes from a home toilet) were properly disposed. With the combination of pumpout facilities, mobile pumpout services, and educational programs such as Honey Pot Day, boaters increase their knowledge and understanding behind proper waste disposal, which directly benefits local water quality.

If you are interested in an exciting, in-depth boating safety course, check out the in classroom (seminar) version of our popular online boating course.

This beginner boating class will give you the knowledge needed to obtain a boat license or safety certification in many states. Many boat insurance companies will offer discounts on boating insurance to boaters who successfully complete About Boating Safely.

Topics Include:

**Introduction to Boating** – Types of power boats; sailboats; outboards; paddle boats; houseboats; different uses of boats; various power boating engines; jet drives; family boating basics.

Boating Law - Boat registration; boating regulation; hull identification number; required boat safety equipment; operating safely and reporting accidents; protecting the marine environment; Federal boat law; state boating laws; personal watercraft requirements.

Boat Safety Equipment -Personal flotation devices («life jackets»); fire extinguishers; sound-producing devices; visual-distress signals; dock lines and rope; first aid kit; anchors and anchor lines; other boating safety equipment.

Safe Boating - Bow riding; alcohol and drug abuse; entering, loading, and trimming a boat; fueling portable and permanent tanks; steering with a tiller and a wheel; docking, undocking and mooring; knots; filing a float plan; checking equipment, fuel, weather and tides; using charts; choosing and using an anchor; safe PWC handling; general water safety.

Navigation-The U.S. Aids to Navigation system; types of buoys and beacons; navigation rules (sometimes referred to as right-of-way rules); avoiding collisions; sound signals; PWC «tunnel vision.»

Boating Problems-Hypothermia; boating accidents and rescues; man overboard recovery; capsizing; running aground; river hazards; strainers: emergency radio calls; engine problems; equipment failures; carbon monoxide (CO); other boating and PWC problems.

Trailering, Storing and Protecting Your Boat-Trailers; trailer brakes, lights, hitches, tires, and bearings; loading, balancing, and towing a trailer; towing (and backing) a trailer; boat launching and retrieving; boat storage and theft protection; launching, retrieving and storing a PWC.

Hunting and Fishing, Water-skiing and River Boating -Carrying hunting gear and weapons in a boat; fishing from a boat; water-skiing safety guidelines and hand signals; waterskiing with a PWC; navigating rivers, and other boating tips.
